From Rabbi Brian Walt

Dear Friends,

I have just returned home from my April visit and am looking forward to my next visit. This year, I will be coming for a longer visit over two weekends in June (June 19-June 28). On these two Shabbatot in June, Goldali Danberg-Biggs and Zoey Zentner will be called to the Torah in celebration of their b'not mitzvah.

Over the past few months, I have really enjoyed working with bat/r mitzvah students and their families and am looking forward to these first two Tikkun v'Or b'not mitzvah that I will be officiating. In this letter, I want to share a goal I have as I take on rabbinic leadership of bat mitzvah celebrations and to ask for your involvement in this significant part of our community life.

A bat/r mitzvah celebration is when a child is welcomed into the Jewish community. It could be thought of as a tribal initiation rite, a welcoming into the tribe. It is my hope that our bat/r mitzvah students will truly be welcomed into community. Too often in liberal American synagogues, the bat/r mitzvah is a private personal family celebration. While the personal family celebration is really important and moving, it is also important that we teach our children the value of community and communal life. A connection and concern for community is central to Jewish life and one of the most important Jewish values that we can pass down to the next generation.

Over the past few years, we have developed a monthly adult Shabbat morning service and a Shabbat morning community. It is my hope that the bat/r mitzvah students will feel welcomed into this community and that all TvO members will regard it as a mitzvah to come to bat/r mitzvah celebrations. Over the past year, I have tried to nurture a relationship between the adult members of our community and the children who are preparing for bat mitzvah. I would like us to do all we can to encourage these relationships and want to ask you all to invest in developing a relationship with the young people in our community.

I am also hoping to enlist your help in guiding our bat/r mitzvah students in terms of their *tikkun olam/tzedakah* projects. Would members of TvO who are involved in social justice projects be willing to share their work with the bat/r mitzvah students? Could we develop a list of social justice issues in which adult members are involved and make connections between the students and the appropriate person or committee in our synagogue? Could we help our young people to understand that our commitment to *tikkun olam* is not only about giving some money to alleviate suffering, as important as this is, but it is primarily about working for justice (*tzedek*), for peace and for a sustainable world?

These are just some initial ideas. What ideas do you have about creating meaningful and joyful bat and bar mitzvah ceremonies? What would you like to suggest? Do you have a skill (music, creative arts, an intellectual interest, a Jewish skill) you would like to share with our younger members?

I hope to see you at the b'not mitzvah ceremonies of Goldali and Zoey in June. Come welcome them into our community. Come learn who they are and what they care about. Come share in this important community event.

Goldali Danberg-Biggs, daughter of Robert Danberg and Mary Biggs, will be called to the

Torah in honor of her becoming a bat mitzvah. The Torah portion, Korach, tells the story of the rebellion of Korach, a Levite who challenges Moses. “You take too much upon yourselves, for the entire congregation are all holy, and God is in their midst. So why do you raise yourselves above the Lord’s assembly?” The rebellion doesn’t go so well for Korach and his supporters who are swallowed up alive by the earth.

Many of us see Korach as a democrat, an advocate for a broad sharing of power among all the people, yet his rebellion is squashed and he and his supporters are all killed.

Goldali will reflect on the meaning of Korach’s rebellion and invite us all to discuss how we see Korach and his actions. What is the role of rebellion and resistance to authority in our lives?

When is rebellion helpful and when is it destructive? Why does the Torah portray Korach in such a negative light?

Shavuot begins on Saturday, May 23 , 2015

Shavuot is the Hebrew word for “weeks” and refers to the Jewish festival marking the giving of the Torah at Mount Sinai, which occurs seven weeks after Passover. Shavuot, like many other Jewish holidays, began as an ancient agricultural festival that marked the end of the spring barley harvest and the beginning of the summer wheat harvest. In ancient times, Shavuot was a pilgrimage festival during which Israelites brought crop offerings to the Temple in Jerusalem.

Today, it is a celebration of Torah, education, and actively choosing to participate in Jewish life. Customs include reading the book of Ruth, all-night study sessions, decorating with greens and flowers, and eating dairy foods, because Jewish tradition compares the words of Torah to the sweetness of milk and honey.

NOTES FROM THE BUILDING COMMITTEE:

Our kitchen ceiling problem ... hopefully solved at last!

As we all know, the kitchen-ceiling-leak problem has been an (unfortunately) recurring issue over the past couple of years. We're happy to say we believe the problem has been solved and will soon be fully ameliorated. But first some background:

The problem begins with the placement of our furnace. Most homes and other buildings have their furnace in the basement. That's where ours would be as well—if we had a basement. But since our Temple building was built on a slab, the furnace had to go into the attic. In this case, that's the space above the kitchen.

All furnaces, a bit counter-intuitively, drip water as the gas fire burns. This water, called "condensate," is supposed to be led outside or into a floor or footer drain to drain harmlessly away. And in most cases, there's very little water involved.

In our case, the condensate water was draining in pipes that ran in the attic space above the kitchen ceiling and down the outside wall. But, with the ridiculously cold winters we've experienced for two successive years, those pipes froze, the condensate water backed up, and leaked into the kitchen ceiling.

We knew this was the problem two years ago when this happened the first time, and we thought we had solved it. What we didn't know was that, contrary to what all on-site plumbing personnel could observe, there were no fewer than SIX condensate pipes waiting to back up. We fixed two; we didn't know there were four more.

Now we do, and the solution, as proposed by volunteer consultant Ian Shapiro, is to re-route all six condensate pipes into the interior space of the kitchen ceiling. This will require some plumbing and carpentry but will keep these pipes safely inside the warmth of the building where they won't freeze and the condensate water can go its happy way down the drain. Once this work is done, we'll repair the ceiling for good.

Rabbi Brian led two *farbrengen* sessions (gatherings) with stories, songs, and even a little dancing.

Gan and Kitah Alef א כיתה (K/grade 1) chopped apples and tasted charoset. They even saw Moses (Joe Yavitt) bring the 10 Commandments down from Mt. Sinai (the heater space above the kitchen).

Bereavement Support Group

Several years ago Rabbi Brian offered a class—The Jewish Way in Death and Mourning—which gave impetus to forming the Tikkun v'Or Bereavement Support Group.

The kavana or intention of the group is to put 'theory' from the class into practice, providing support at times of bereavement and assisting Congregation members and others in thinking about how we would like to honor and remember loved ones, and be remembered ourselves at the end of life.

A trio of bereavement guides compiled by the group will soon be available on the Tikkun v'Or website.

Each of the three related guides honors the spirit and traditions of Judaism, but also suggests ways of adapting traditional practices for modern times and for our multicultural community:

- **Jewish Practices and Rituals for Death and Mourning** describes traditional and alternative Jewish practices during the period leading up to the end-of-life and for the year following a death.
- **When a Loved One Dies: Local Resources** focuses on resources in the Ithaca area, and lays out the chain of communications and decisions needed when faced with the death of a loved one.
- **Ma'ariv for a House of Shiva: Evening Service for the First Week of Remembrance** is a compilation of traditional and contemporary prayers, poetry and other readings for gatherings during the initial mourning period following burial.

While the guides are organized for easy reference at times of crisis, we recommend becoming familiar with the material before the death of a loved one. Doing so would provide invaluable opportunity to consider how to approach this sacred time, discuss it with others, and lay plans.

In addition to these written materials, congregants are welcome to contact Rabbi Brian for pastoral support and counseling, and members of the Bereavement Support Group for additional guidance and assistance.

The group recently held an initial conversation with congregants about what we have learned and the life cycle support we hope to weave into the fabric of the Tikkun v'Or community. We can be contacted at bereavementsupport@tikkunvor.org.

From this inception, they tracked down and collected rare poems "piyutim" that were almost lost to the world, along with unique melodies to the Libyan hymns. The Poems were selected and arranged and produced under the guidance of Yaniv Raba and Yankale Segal. Their album "Wandering" was released in 2012. Together they introduce the rich musical tradition of the Jews of Libya, unique in the fascinating combination of various musical styles - Arabic music, African, Turkish, Arabic, Western and more.

Roots: Israelis and Palestinians Share Peacework**June 3**

Ali Abu Awwad, a Palestinian educator, and Rabbi Hanan Schlesinger, an Israeli, lead organizers of *Roots*, are coming to Ithaca this June!

Roots is a grassroots reconciliation and peace effort in Israel, featuring Palestinian and Orthodox Jewish settler voices, rarely heard together. *Roots* offers a hopeful, constructive frame for thinking about peace in Israel. The project includes a center for non-violence study and action in the West Bank, where 150 Palestinians and over 150 Israeli settlers are already members.

The goal of the program is to raise awareness about *Roots*' peace work in the West Bank; to encourage respect and dialogue across differences -- in Israel, and in our community; and to give Ithaca area residents an opportunity to contribute financially to this organization.
