From Rabbi Brian Walt

Dear Friends,

Cheshvan is the name of the second month of the Jewish calendar, one of the only months in the Jewish calendar without any special holy days. It follows Tishrei, the first month that is so full of holidays: Rosh Hashanah, Yom Kippur, Sukkot, and Simchat Torah. Cheshvan is also called Marcheshvan. The word “mar” in Hebrew means bitter and one interpretation is that it is called “the bitter month” because it has no holidays. (It is also possible that Marcheshvan is just the full name of the month.)

I think that there is an important teaching here for all of us. Cheshvan is the month of the ordinary. After Rosh Hashanah, Yom Kippur, Sukkot and Simchat Torah, we return to our ordinary lives and it is time for us to bring what we have learned and experienced during the holidays into our ordinary lives.

Jack Kornfield, the Buddhist teacher, has a wonderful book, *After the Ecstasy, the Laundry*, in which he explores how we can access the spiritual insights we have at special times in our ordinary lives – when we need to do the laundry. Cheshvan is the Jewish month in which we work on just that task, seeing the extraordinary in the ordinary. It is the month when we integrate what we have learned and experienced on the holidays into our lives. Sometimes when we move from the holidays to ordinary days it may feel bitter, but the challenge of life is to live mindfully, joyfully, consciously not only on holidays but on ordinary days - to find the holy and the special in the ordinary.

At the beginning of our Rosh Hashanah services, I invited us all to see the good in each of us, in everyone else and around us. I also invited us all to act in our lives for the good of all, to make sure that our actions bring love, justice and blessing not only to us but to everyone, to all. I hope this month brings you many blessings and that we all can bring the love, compassion and insight of the holidays in our everyday lives.

Shabbat service and dish-to-pass dinner

Rabbi Brian Walt and Azameyra, the TVO singers, directed by Marnie Kamp, will lead the service.

Join us for a short family-friendly Shabbat service followed by a dish-to-pass Shabbat dinner. The evening includes: a short Kabbalat Shabbat service with Shabbat table rituals, personal reflection and sharing appropriate for children and adults. Following the meal there will be communal folk dancing and singing with our own band.

We haven't had one of these for a while and this is a great opportunity for young and old to come together to share a joyous and inspiring Shabbat. Come meet new people and strengthen connections with others in the community. If you know very little about Shabbat, or if you do it every week, you will leave with a neshama yetera (the extra soul) - the gift of Shabbat. Hanan is the American-born rabbi who became a religious settler in the West Bank and now is also an activist promoting an Israeli-Palestinian 'joint vision for the future of our Peoples.' He spoke with Palestinian activist Ali Abu Awwad at the Roots program in June.



Brotherhood of Erstwhile Enemies

We were two Christian Palestinians, four Muslim Palestinians, and six Jewish Israelis. The Christians were from Bethlehem, both veterans of nonviolent resistance to the Israeli occupation. One had been deported from Israel over 25 years ago because of the danger he was deemed to pose to the State of Israel. Two of the Muslims were former members of the Palestinian Liberation Organization who had spent many years in Israeli jails for acts of violence resistance. The Israelis were religious settlers, longtime residents of Gush Etzion in Judea, fervent believers in the right of the Jewish People to the Land of Israel. Two of the Israeli were rabbis, myself among them.

It was the eve of the eve of Rosh haShana. At least for the Jews, presumably not the most auspicious time for such a get-together. Many of us had pressing preparations for the approaching holiday to see to. But I had just returned to Israel the afternoon before from a speaking and fundraising tour in Switzerland, and two of the Palestinians were about to leave the country for the USA and Jordan respectively; it was the only time that we could find to sit down together.

We were there to discuss our joint vision for the future of our Peoples in this war-torn sliver of land that we both call home. For about a year we have been in the process of creating something absolutely unique, Roots/Shorashim/Judur, the Palestinian Israeli grassroots initiative for understanding, nonviolence and transformation. It was time to see if we could begin to formulate a vision statement for this fledgling movement.

We expected it to be difficult, even stormy. It wasn't. Over the course of the last sixteen or so months, we have learned to listen to each other and to absorb what we hear. We have come to understand each other; we feel for the other and his nation. We know what they need and we fervently desire for them to have it. It used to be that we each carried on our shoulder the burden of our nation. Today all of us also carry on our second shoulder the burden of the other nation. While each of us identifies first and foremost with our own People - its struggles and its triumphs, we have developed a new language, perhaps even a shared identity.

After a long and fruitful give and take, we came up with something that we all felt we could all agree upon. It was far from what I had expected, but I was satisfied, although still challenged. Until a year and a half ago, I would never have imagined myself participating in such a forum, let alone feeling comfortable with such a statement. I have come a long way. We have all come a long way – together.

Again and again we read it over, tentatively, wondering to ourselves how we had come so far, and if we were ready:

We envision a new social and political reality that is founded on dignity, trust, and a mutual recognition of and respect for each People's historic belonging to the entire land.

And then it dawned on me with utter clarity: This discussion was not an interlude taking us away from our preparations for Rosh haShana. This was of the essence of Rosh haShana itself, as we repeat again and again in the Amida for the holiday:

May all human beings create one brotherhood to do Your will with an undivided heart.

For two thousand years we have prayed that we may make one brotherhood with those who have been our enemies to do good and to make peace together, but have been unable to take practical steps towards the fruition of this dream. Now we can ... and we must ... and we are.

It is very hard to write this bulletin when violence has escalated so dramatically in Israel. My first version of this letter was very emotional and charged. My second version avoided this subject altogether. Then I decided I must address the current events. Our organization supports Jews worldwide and the state of Israel, and does not take any political stands, not regarding the democratically elected US government, nor the democratically elected Israeli government. Just as we, as individuals, do not support every act of the US government, neither do we, as individuals, support every act of the Israeli government.

Israel has made numerous attempts to forge a peace process, but none were acceptable to the Palestinians. I will simply refer you to *The Missing Peace*, by Dennis Ross, who was involved in the peace talks, to read on your own what was offered. In the absence of full peace, the Arabs in the West Bank do live under Israeli military rule, and this does present hardships. What are we to do when we see Palestinian Arabs attacking those it perceives as Jews with knives, daggers, screw drivers, cement blocks and Molotov cocktails? Imams have been videotaped giving sermons holding daggers and advocating these attacks. I am worried about the safety of all who live in Israel, and the climate and conditions which have led to this state of affairs.

What to do? Pray for peace and well-being for all. Contact friends and family to let them know they are in your thoughts and prayers. Educate yourselves by reading from a variety of news sites including those on the ground in Israel. Support programs that encourage dialogue between our peoples, Jews and Arabs, of whatever religious affiliation or lack thereof. There is no simple answer, unfortunately. It is easy to give up on peace and just worry about our own people. Someday we will have to sit down and make peace. We cannot succumb to hate. These are very challenging times.

On a different note, I want to encourage everyone to take advantage of the many wonderful speakers being brought to our community. These talks are free and open to the public. I urge you all to refer to the websites of Hillel at Cornell and Ithaca College, Jewish Studies departments at Cornell and Ithaca College, Chabad of Ithaca, and the Ithaca Coalition for Unity and Cooperation in the Middle East. Rabbi Lord Jonathan Sacks will be speaking at Cornell on Wednesday April 20, 2016. **Come hear how Israeli Arabs and Jews are providing emergency relief around the world including to Syrian refugees in Europe, Sunday afternoon Nov 15th at 3 PM, Temple Beth El– the work of IsraAid!**
