Co-Presidents' Words

דברי הנשיא

Dear friends, the shortest day of the year is behind us and as the days get longer, Lauren and I are getting excited about the future of TvO. We'd like to address two important changes that are currently occurring within our congregation.

First, as many of you have heard, Rabbi Brian has announced his retirement and, with the board's support, is reducing his time next year. Like many of you, we feel so blessed to have had these past 10 years with the Rabbi. We, as individuals and as a community, have grown by attending the classes, events and services he led and facilitated. And now, it is time for our journeys to diverge. While the Rabbi goes on to spend more time with his family and enjoy a well-earned retirement, we will be embarking on a rabbi search. I have been working closely with URJ to understand the search and hiring process and to develop one that is uniquely suited to who we are. The members of the search committee will be nominated and announced by the end of the month and will reflect a cross-section of our diverse community. In February we will hold a congregational meeting to review the findings of the survey and allow those findings and your voice to help shape our new rabbinical job posting. Following that, the search committee will be working to invite prospective rabbis for shabbatons during the 2019-2020 school year. Lauren and I are excited to delve into the possibilities that this process will open up.

Secondly, following the tragic shooting at the Tree of Life Synagogue, we know that some people have concerns regarding safety protocols at the Temple. Again, Lauren and I would like to outline the steps we are taking to ensure the safety of our community. We have been in touch both with URJ and the Tompkins County Sheriff's Department to help us determine next steps. Many may have noticed the new signs on the doors, reminding us to keep all doors, except the main entrance, shut all the way so that they are locked. In addition, we are in communication with the Sheriff's Department about the dates of our big events such as holidays and bar/bat mitzvahs. During those times, we will be added to the patrol route. You may not see their cars, but they will be driving by frequently. On January 22nd from 7-9 p.m. the Sheriff's Department will be doing a two hour training for us. This training is during a regularly scheduled board meeting and we would like to extend an invitation to anyone who would like to join. After this training, we will collaborate with the department on ways in which we can increase security measures, if needed. Our goal is to increase safety and security while remaining an open and welcoming community to all.

Gan and Kitah Alef כיתה א (K/grade 1) celebrated the Ethiopian Israeli holiday of Sigd, with special guest Simha Tamano, the Israel Fellow at Cornell University. She will be joining us in other classes later in the year. They have also been taking home Mimi the Mitzvah Bear, doing mitzvot at home and sharing them with the class. Her name starts with the Hebrew letter Mem, just like Melech (King) Solomon and Malka (Queen).

Kitah Bet/Gimel כיתה ב/ג (grades 2/3) explored the different names for God and the ways people use those names at different times. They are also learning about mitzvot which help people, animals, and the community, and what values are supported by mitzvot. All the students are doing well developing Hebrew reading skills!

Kitah Daled/Hey כיתה ד/ה (grades 5/6) explored the question, "What is a creation myth?" They students created ('*asah*) the world out of clay. One week they looked for "Or" - light -- in many places -- especially at Tikkn v'Or, but even in dORitos and OReos! For Chanukah, they considered the multiple themes of the holiday, including (but definitely not limited to) lights, charity, gift-giving, family, food, games, song, story, freedom, thanksgiving, dedication, the miracle of lights, Jewish pride, heroes, miracles, oppression, identity, religious freedom and expression. They also had a pajama morning, with popcorn and scenes from "Fiddler on the Roof" to discuss as they learn about the many places and cultures that Jews have come from.

Kitah Vav/Zayin כיתה ו/ז (grade 6/7), have been considering the meanings of prayers as they learn to read more of them. They discussed the Jewish values of the stories of Chanukah, and encouraged Obie as he prepared for his bar mitzvah. They also explored the complexities in the stories of Joseph and his brothers, and shared what they know of the immigrant experiences of their families. They have been reading sections of the parasha in Hebrew, and learning to recognize shorashim (root words), plurals, and prefixes and suffixes on Sundays and in the midweek class

On **January 6**, our Religious School classes will be **meeting at Temple Beth-El** (402 N. Tioga St) from 9 am - 12 pm for a special morning of "JEWISH OUR WAY," a program using PJ OUR WAY and PJ LIBRARY books to explore Jewish identity, friendship, and God. The combined Religious Schools will have a fun morning together, so please be on time! This program is for our Gan /Alef students too!

On **Sunday January 13** we will welcome special guest **Steve Scheinken**, author of the "Rabbi Harvey" books, for Ha'Asharah (enrichment) for part of our morning.

On **January 20** our Ha'Asharah (enrichment) session will be **Elisa Sciscioli Keeler and Harmony Malone of "Honey Child Soul" for a workshop on "Music for Unity and Social Change"** in honor of Martin Luther King Jr. Day.

Sunday, February 10, 2019 3:00 p.m. in the social hall.

A film that brings to light, for the first time, the Holocaust of the Jewry of former Yugoslavia. The Holocaust in Yugoslavia resulted in the slaying of 84% of the members of its Jewish community, who previously did not suffer any form of discrimination. Stella, the film's protagonist and a young Israeli born in Yugoslavia, researches the nature of the extermination of Jews in each region of Yugoslavia, the part played in it by the Germans, and the part played by the various nationalities that constitute Yugoslavia. In parallel, Stella explores the fate of her Muslim great-grandfather who saved Jews during the Holocaust and was therefore nominated as a Righteous Among the Nations by Yad Vashem. The voyage crisscrosses all the provinces of the former Yugoslavia, with the route shown in animation on a map to orient the viewer.

IAUJC is not extremely well known. Perhaps it is the lengthy name. Or perhaps people's lives are just so busy, that they don't take notice. I myself was not really aware of the group after I moved to Ithaca. And then I was asked to join. In 2008, I became both the campaign chair and the program chair. The work is considerable, but well worth the effort. This endeavor puts me in close touch with many Jewish people. I work with and highly respect folks at the Hillels, Chabad, Tikkun v'Or, Temple Beth El, the Israeli community and many unaffiliated Jews in Ithaca. We work together for the benefit of everyone. It is a bit of an uphill enterprise, as you might expect, because the Jews in our general community tend to disagree over many issues. Our board however has been able to agree on four important pillars:

Supporting a thriving local Jewish community

Engaging the next generation

Caring for Jews in need locally and globally


Supporting a vibrant Israel

We work on these goals with great care and are helped by every dollar that our donors contribute, from the \$18 gifts to the \$500,000 endowment bequeathed by Bob and Marcia Ascher.

- We provide annual grants to local organizations, including the TvO religious school.
- We help to send children to Jewish summer camps.
- We send PJ Library books to about 120 children every month.
- We bring together young Jewish families with our holiday celebrations, and organize intergenerational events, bringing seniors into contact with children.
- We hold an annual Holocaust commemoration at TBE, attended by hundreds of people of all backgrounds.
- We support a Holocaust education speaker's bureau that reached approximately 566 middle and high school students in the local area this past year.
- We sponsor educational and cultural events that are free to the public.
- We provide funds, through donor gifts, used around the world to help people in trouble.
- We send funds to elderly Jews in Tbilisi, Georgia, to help them with basic needs.
- We provide support to the school children in Dimona, Israel who come from families at risk.
- Through an anonymous gift, we support three humanitarian organizations in the south of Israel, that help young people and their families succeed in their lives.

My personal goal, as a member of the IAUJC, is to continue to network with different groups and to help us truly become a "united community." I ask you to familiarize yourself with our work and to join in the effort, in whatever way you are able.
