Religious School

בית ספר תיקון ואור

Kol Hakavod and a shout out to our amazing Religious School teachers and students! They transitioned to online learning without barely a hiccup, sharing their homes and stories and continuing their Jewish community education. On **May 17**, we'll come together as a school for a "Zoom Siyyum" (siyyum is a concluding celebration), to honor our graduating students, sing a few songs, and share ideas for Jewish learning over the summer.

Kitah Gan/Alef אג /א (K/grade 1) read books with Rabbi Tziona Szajman, played a home scavenger hunt for Passover, met alpacas (!), played Shimon Omer, and climbed a mountain to hear the Ten Commandments.

Kitah Bet/Gimel בג /ג (grades 2/3) continued to learn Hebrew with Morah Chava (Miranda Phillips), celebrate birthdays together, and sing. They considered that one of the ways to say "Jews" in Hebrew is "*Yehudim*," the root of which is "*hodaya*" -- thankfulness, and that another Hebrew word for Jews is "*Yisrael*," the root of which means "struggle." What are we thankful for, and what do we struggle with?

Kitah Daled ד /ד (grade 4) talked with Michael Margolin about Exodus, shared magic tricks, and researched Jewish change-makers, including Rose Schneiderman, Levi Strauss, Carl Sagan, and Steven Spielberg. They read *Snow in Jerusalem* and talked about the people and communities of Israel and Palestine.

Kitah Hey ה /ה (grades 5) students and their teacher Jeff Bercuvitz took on the challenging topics of "How do we, as Jews, respond to fear?" How might music, prayer, practice, and hand-washing help us be prepared for difficult times? They played "Jew-pardy" and continued to ask Big Jew-cy Questions.

Kitah Vav/Zayin וז /ז (grade 6/7) students talked about the things that are most precious to them. ("If you could only take one thing into the desert with you, what would it be?") They took turns reading from the weekly parasha, which includes detailed instructions for making the Breastplate of Decision. They examined the breastplate on the TvO Torah and talked about the significance of each part, and then created their own breastplates using a set of play jewels and discussed the stones' symbolic meanings. They played a physically demanding game that connected the Torah reading with Steven Spielberg, Harrison Ford, and the Indiana Jones movies.

On line with Mirit Bessire and Kenny Berkowitz, they discussed coping with being at home, the Hebrew calendar, and the Torah portions for the week.

The midweek class with Cantor Abbe Lyons made lunches for people experiencing homelessness and food insecurity, and learned a bit about *Birkat Hamazon*, the blessing after meals

We're also looking into options for independent on-line Hebrew study programs to offer for the summer, especially for our upper elementary and middle school students. While the most important thing right now is everyone's health and safety, and the community and camaraderie we have together, we are also thinking of those who are thinking ahead to bnai mitzvah celebrations and Hebrew learning to be able to continue their studies in the months ahead. These strange times bring some new opportunities, and we will be letting you know what is available as soon as possible.

Ithaca Sanctuary Allianca

The COVID-19 pandemic has greatly impacted all of us in our own communities and around the world. There is not one part of our lives that has not been touched. There are many needs that we have been asked to fulfill. The Tompkins County Immigrant Rights Coalition (TCIRC) is asking you to support another critical need, that of individuals being released from the Buffalo Federal Detention Facility.

People inside the detention center are desperate. As one declared, "Being detained here, we are like the proverbial lamb waiting to be slaughtered." Releases of some people from detention are underway due to the tremendous efforts of regional immigrant rights organizations to connect people with lawyers and to pay their bonds. But they cannot get released without an address/place to go, for at least two weeks to quarantine. Here in Central New York, we can provide help with the following:

*Housing for at least two weeks, e.g., detached spare room, apartment, or camper that can house an individual or a family (we will provide you with public health guidelines).

*Funds to pay for AirBnB-type accommodations, food, medications, personal protective equipment, sanitation supplies, transportation, and other needs. Donate here

*Transportation (if you are not in a vulnerable population) from Batavia to Ithaca and/or to their final destination post-quarantine (we will provide you with public health guidelines)

*To offer housing or transportation (or learn more about how to do this safely), please contact Patricia Rodriguez at prodriguez@ithaca.edu.

Please consider donating a portion of the stimulus check you expect to receive. Note that once we have housing, we will also be seeking food, clothing, and laptops, tablets, or phones.

Funds will be collected by TCIRC and shared with our partners in Buffalo and Rochester. We appreciate whatever you can give.

Dear TvO community,

I am sending prayers of healing and recovery for all those who are not well and a hope that you are finding a way to stay connected and navigate through these difficult times.

I believe our kindness and endurance as a Jewish people can contribute to this difficult moment.

Our Jewish values guide us to give tzedakah, or justice-driven charity in this time. As a Jew I am called to give my stimulus check to communities who have been left out of government support.
