Kitah Bet/Gimel כיתה ב/ג (grades 2/3) students have become wonderful emerging Hebrew readers! They heard many Jewish folktales, considered the importance of holidays and human rights, and asked what they can do to help others.

Kitah Daled/Hey כיתה ד/ה (grades 4/5) noted the coming of spring and recited blessings on seeing flowers for the first time in the season. How do we become more aware of the changes around us? Students researched Justice Changemakers and shared what they learned.

Kitah Vav/Zayin כיתה ו/ז (grades 6/7) is all about questions. They learned about Jewish baseball player and spy, Moe Berg and wondered about the parts of ourselves we hide from others. They listened to Chuck Berry's "Promised Land" and asked how do we form identities as individuals, and as a people? How does can companies show commitment to racial justice? How do we make decisions? How did the Israelites in the Torah make decisions? Every Torah portion offers questions for our lives today. How do we find some answers?

We share answers among students, madrichim (assistants), and morim (teachers), add insight from Jewish sources, examine traditions, and consider our own experiences to make valuable connections.

Some poems will be familiar; some poems were part of the Miriam Chaikin Poetry Prize (on Westbeth.org). Other writing included was from 30 poems/30 days composed to support TVO member Barbara Regenspan's fundraiser for Ithaca Sanctuary Alliance. Fran's poems are about family, the Jewish experience, loss and remembrance. She hopes she channeled the sacred in everyday, "ordinary" people, events, objects in our lives. This summer, she'll be attending Marge Piercy's poetry workshop and would love to share new work with her temple family.

Tony Gaenslen has recently published *A Hard Road to Justice / My Life as a Renegade Lawyer*, an account of his lifetime of activism in the Civil Rights, justice, and labor movements.

"This book is about how I went from being a Southerner idealizing Robert E. Lee to jumping into the Civil Rights movement, eventually spending 11 days in a Mississippi death-row jail cell for registering Black people to vote. It recounts my days as a lawyer in California for Cesar Chavez, where I had to be David fighting Goliath, the corporations. It describes how I sued Cornell University for discriminating against its women faculty and how I won that case. My hope is that my story will inspire others to "jump in" and join the great struggle for justice and freedom in our country right now."

"Shavuot celebrates the giving of the Torah at Mount Sinai and encourages us to embrace the Torah's teachings and be inspired by the wisdom Jewish tradition has to offer.

Shavuot is the Hebrew word for "weeks," and the holiday occurs seven weeks after Passover. Shavuot, like many other Jewish holidays, began as an ancient agricultural festival that marked the end of the spring barley harvest and the beginning of the summer wheat harvest. In ancient times, Shavuot was a pilgrimage festival during which Israelites brought crop offerings to the Temple in Jerusalem. Today, it is a celebration of Torah, education, and the choice to participate actively in Jewish life." Shavuot begins this year on Sunday, May 15 at sunset.

Dear Friends,

Our IAUJC board members are grateful to reach this season, with vaccinations on the rise, and the hope of a more normal life ahead. We have all needed to adapt, to learn new ways to communicate, to help others, to pray and to gather. It is inspiring to see just how adaptable we are.

We are also so very grateful to the 214 donors who contributed to our 2020 annual campaign. Our donors remembered our mission and supported it, despite the isolation caused by the pandemic. We raised a total of \$83,879 in 2020, and will soon be making grants to our local Jewish organizations, based on the funds designated for that use.

We started the Hesed Emergency Fund in 2020, which aims to help members of our community who are in financial distress. Thank you to those who support this fund. It is being used carefully and thoughtfully. Keep us in mind if you know of anyone who needs a helping hand with expenses. The new 2021 campaign is now underway. We invite you to take action and then feel the satisfaction of preserving a strong Jewish community, here in Ithaca and around the world. We hope you will join your friends and neighbors in this task.

On the evening of April 7th, we hosted a virtual Holocaust Commemoration, with 93 active screens and a group of wonderful participants. We honored Gale Halpern and Rita Melen, who talked about their parents' experiences during the Holocaust, and their own participation in the Ithaca Holocaust Speakers' Bureau. We lit candles in memory of the lives lost. We heard from the Yiddish singers, Abi Gazunte, from Cantor Richard Rosenfield and from Lexi Leitner, a student at IC, who sang Hatikvah. We also heard from Shelley Wernick, about the JFNA's Holocaust Survivors Initiative. It was a moving and educational evening.
