Meet Rabbi Shifrah Tobacman

דברי הרבא

Rabbi Shifrah came to TvO in July 2021 from the San Francisco Bay Area. She describes herself as a rabbi, interfaith chaplain, and poet with a healer's spirit, a holistic bent, and a dedication to social, economic, and environmental justice.

Rabbi Shifrah comes to TvO with much experience, not only as a spiritual leader, but as a person who has taken on a variety of vocational and avocational endeavors over the years. After a ten-year career as a body worker, she worked for twenty years in the fields of health education and public health. This led her into the arenas of HIV/AIDS, disease prevention and management, patient empowerment, respiratory health, healthy housing, and health equity. She holds an MPA in health care and organizational change, and an MA in religious studies.

She cut her teeth as a progressive and social justice activist when she was a community organizer in Chicago in the late 1970s-1980s. As a long-time seeker, she found her spiritual home when she met creative progressive Jews interested in renewing Judaism to reflect their values while infusing it with spiritual meaning, and this has been her path ever since. Her spiritual and political travels also drew her to the deep activism of Compassionate Listening, which she sees as a necessary companion to compassionate action.

Rabbi Shifrah was ordained by the Aleph Alliance for Jewish Renewal in 2015. During her studies, she delighted in her work as a rabbinic intern for Congregation Ner Shalom in Cotati, CA. Since ordination, she worked for a number of years as chaplain for an organization that serves low-income seniors, particularly those living in underserved and marginalized communities. She has also served on and been the liturgical lead for a *chevra kadisha* in the Bay Area for many years, and has been an active leader and teacher in her Bay Area communities.

Rabbi Shifrah grew up in Cleveland, Ohio, and her wife Ruth grew up in Central Illinois. So in spite of Ithaca's cold winters, they're happy to be reacquainting themselves with the more dramatic seasons found here in New York.

Contemplative Morning Services: Tuesdays from 8:30-9:30 a.m.

This weekly morning service, alive with music, poetry, prayer, quiet contemplation and a sense of community, has become a weekly anchor for many of us in these uncertain times.

Led by Lauren Korfine, Diana Levy, Judy Saul, and Dalya Tamir. All are welcome!

We are thrilled to welcome back so many students in person, and to meet new students joining us this year! While we all learned a lot on zoom last year, I'm looking forward to returning to learning in the same space. This year's learning will include:

- * **Judaic Studies** - history, holidays, mitzvot, and Torah
- * **Hebrew** (*Ivrit*) עברית learning to decode the letters and vowels and read Hebrew for participation and leadership in prayer services, with an understanding of the meanings of the words.
- * **Ruach** (spirit) רוח **and Tefillah** (prayer) תפילה: Songs and short prayer services to practice what we are learning, with plenty of ruach (spirit and singing). Praying together as a community is an important way for children to practice what they are learning in class, build on their knowledge of Hebrew, and experience some aspects of Jewish spirituality. We will meet as a full group about once a month for tefillah, and as separate classes on the other weeks.
- * **Hafsakah** (break / snack) הפסקה Playing and eating together is also important! This year the madrichim will be the only ones serving snack, and we will use single-serving items when appropriate, but also keeping in mind our commitment to reducing waste.
- * **Chugim** (electives / not "ch" as in "change" but "CH" as in "CHallah.") Special projects including art, drama, dance, music, and mitzvot, to work on as a whole school or for holiday celebrations.
- * **Ha'asharah** (enrichment from special guests) העשרה We will let you know when special guests will be joining us so that parents can come learn with us too! **Rabbi Shifrah** will be our special guest several times this year.

Jewish Learning Experiences (JLE) for students in grades 2-7 will begin on **Sunday, September 19 at 9 am at TVO**. Classes will be every Sunday after that through December 19 (except November 28).

Miranda Phillips will be teaching ביתה בג' / ד' / ה kitah bet-daled-gimel-hey -- the second, third, fourth, and fifth graders -- as a still-to-be-named cohort. (We can't keep calling them bet-daled-gimel-hey!) They will have additional guidance from several experienced madrichim, and will often separate into smaller groups for discussions and Hebrew study.

Kenny Berkowitz will be joined by Ithaca College student **Jacob Hanai** in teaching ביתה וז' / ז' kitah vav/zayin (sixth and seventh grade) on Sundays. Michael Margolin and Jacob will lead them in exploring Judasism on Wednesdays.

Midweek class for kitah vav and zayin (6th and 7th grade) starts on Wednesday, September 29 and continues through December 15 (except for November 24).

This year, due to enrollment and the need for cautious distancing, students in gan (kindergarten) and kitah alef (first grade) will meet monthly on Saturdays as our new **Family JLE** program.

Rabbi Tziona Szajman will lead students and their parents/caregivers in learning and play about Shabbat, holidays, and Torah. Their first program will be on **Saturday, September 11 at 10 am at Littletree Orchards**.

The complete schedule for the year will be posted on the TvO website and sent to all registered families.

She lived her life in Ithaca, NY where she started school at Racker, then went to Caroline, Belle Sherman, Northeast Elementary, Stone Circle, and received a GED diploma from TST BOCES at age 21. After graduation Lianna worked at Challenge where she interned in the Ithaca College dishroom and at Waffle Frolic. Lianna participated in multiple programs for many years at the Ithaca Youth Bureau, CSMA, Best Buddies and many more. She also volunteered at the public library, Greenstar, BJM Elementary School, the Nature Center, the Sciencenter, the SPCA and Loaves and Fishes. She was a longtime member and volunteer at the Ithaca Reform Temple...

She loved animals, both real and stuffed. Lianna was not overly beholden to material things; she was a believer in practicing extreme generosity. After years of collecting dozens of Webkinz stuffed animals, Lianna decided one day she didn't want them anymore and gave them all away, only to begin collecting Webkinz again a year or two later. She did the same with mountains of math workbooks.

Her loss was sudden and devastating. We take comfort knowing that she is wrapped up in the arms of her dear, departed mother Susan, her beloved uncle Rob, and others that we've lost too soon.”

There will be a celebration of Lianna's life when we can all safely gather in a large group. In lieu of flowers her family welcomes you to make a donation to Racker, an organization dedicated to supporting individuals with disabilities and their families in the Ithaca area, which had a big impact on the life of Lianna and her family.

Honoring Our Past, Shaping Our Future

Dear Community Members,

Since 2008, the IAUJC has administered and supported the PJ Library Jewish storybook subscription program in the Ithaca area. A program of the Harold Grinspoon Foundation, PJ Library is made possible through partnerships with philanthropists and local Jewish organizations, such as IAUJC. Families raising kids from birth through 9 years old with Judaism as part of their lives, are welcome to sign up. PJ Library welcomes all Jewish families, whatever their background, knowledge, or family make-up, or observance may be. PJ Library delivers more than 200,000 free Jewish children's books throughout the United States and Canada each month, including the 140 current subscribers in and around Ithaca. Each subscriber receives a title carefully selected for high-quality content and age-level appropriateness. Our subscriber base includes families from as far away as Corning. We also enjoy the participation of Israeli families who come to Cornell for periods of time.

We are proud to say that, since inception we have served a total of 467 children from 308 families with monthly books. In addition, we have sponsored many live events that help families get to know one another and celebrate holidays. We brought performer, Rick Recht to Ithaca to help prepare for Purim in March of 2020. During the pandemic, when gatherings were not possible, we offered monthly gift bags to interested families.

Shira Reisman, a PJ parent stated, "Over the course of the pandemic, PJ Library has helped us feel connected to the greater Ithaca Jewish Community. The monthly holiday bags were integral in making each holiday feel special as well as helping us teach our kids about Jewish traditions."

On August 29th, we held our first in-person event in close to two years. It was a celebration of the holiday season. For such events, IAUJC partners with Tikkun v'Or, Temple Beth El and the Chabad Center at Cornell. The planning included fun activities for the children such as braiding challah dough to bake at home, decorating and wearing crowns, and making greeting cards. There was also an instrument-making activity and then a drumming circle led by Sam Fishman, a professional musician. We celebrated the "Birthday of the World" by making a joyful noise! We heard the shofar and enjoyed each others' company.

The PJ Library has shown itself to be a vital project for IAUJC, touching the lives of so many! You may support this work by making a gift at
