JEWISH LEARNING EXPERIENCES Tikkun Olam Project Proposal



Each bnai mitzvah student at Tikkun v'Or is required to complete a TIKKUN OLAM project. We encourage you to take this opportunity to really focus on how YOU can do *mitzvot* (commandments) and *gemilut chasadim* and *tzedakah* (acting righteously in pursuit of justice) in order to bring *TIKKUN OLAM* (repair of the world).

What inspires you? What bothers you? What do you see that needs fixing in this world? Your Tikkun Olam project is an opportunity to learn from others and to make a difference. Your project should involve thought, time, and energy. It should be more than a one-time event (with certain exceptions) and ideally something you might continue to do even after this year.

Think about projects that will:

- Engage you over a period of time;
- Have direct impact on people (just one person, a few people, or the whole community)'
- Connect you with an adult (especially a member of TvO) involved in the issue;
- Build awareness about an issue;
- Build relationship that will help you grow and learn.

These are not requirements, but suggestions and preferences:

- Projects should serve a local population or have a local or regional connection if possible;
- Projects could potentially change the structures that are hurting people;
- Note that projects do not have to be "original." That is, you do not have to be the first person to think of doing this. You can join a group working on an issue that is important to you. The point is to consider how you are making a difference.

Note that fundraising can be part of a project, but your focus should be on action and/or learning, not on raising money.
